### **MONDAY May 12**

Mr. Simms picked us up. We had hugs and an enthusiastic "Welcome back!" from Ms. Smith and Ms. Westcarr as soon as we walked in the front door at Mico Care Centre. We brought in speech tx and literacy materials, games, toys, and sensory fidgets for use by us and to stay at Mico for future use. Ms. Douglas had schedules and rooms all ready. Ms. Westcarr welcomed the group and gave some Mico history. Ms. Douglas did a quick orientation and sent the group on tours of the building with Ms. Gordan and Ms. Williams.





By 8:30 we were working with kids—we worked with 16 children giving a screener and starting treatment on Monday morning.

We had a wonderful lunch of Jamaican patties and fruit.

Parents came in with 2 children in the afternoon for comprehensive speech-language assessments they had been on the wait list for. We had 2 teams of graduate clinicians and undergraduate observers.

Since this was Maggie's first day as a grad student (following graduation Saturday) and this was her first day with clients to work with, Ms. Aiken stayed close for assistance/support on day 1 ②. Dr. T worked closely with juniors Madison, Ella, Aubrey, and Brianna as they also started working with clients directly for the first time.

The grads finishing up their first year of graduate school were our "seasoned pros" and learned a lot about literacy BEFORE their upcoming literacy course at EIU in June. Dr. Helen Mach, SLP from the Peace Corps, and Mrs. Magee kept an eye out that all was going smoothly with Heidi, Bella, and Molly on day 1.








A few more pictures of working with the children on final morning (Thursday)

The catamaran boat ride and snorkeling were incredible! Jamaica's land and sea are amazingly beautiful!



















Back at RIU at 12:30 Friday to enjoy the resort's amenities until the day pass ended at 6:00

Thank-you also to EIU's Study Abroad program and EIU administration for allowing our continued non-traditional study abroad and wonderful collaboration with Mico. Thanks also to our families who encouraged us to go to Jamaica and were supportive during our time away.

I realize this document is too long already, but I wanted to end with some excerpts of comments from six of the EIU students who have already turned in brief glowing reflections about the therapy abroad week in Jamaica with Mico.

Student 1: Going on the therapy trip to Jamaica was hands down one of the best decisions I've ever made! I learned so much about the culture and really developed my clinical skills. Working with a different culture pushed me out of my comfort zone in the best way, and I know I'm going to be a better clinician because of it. One of the coolest parts was getting to see how schools work in another culture. I also got to work more with literacy clients, which I hadn't done before, it was a great learning experience. Doing diagnostics was eye-opening too. After just the first one, I could already tell I was giving and analyzing assessments differently and more confidently.

The Mico Care Center made us feel so welcome! The staff was amazing, and Brittany Aiken (the SLP at MICO) was super inspiring. She's a total PLS-5 expert, and I really admired the way she interacted with parents and kids. All the kids at Mico stole my heart. They were so awesome and reminded me of why I wanted to be an SLP to begin with.

The food was also delicious! Mico provided delicious lunches every day, and we got to try Jamaican dishes like patties and jerk chicken. Even though being in another country sounded a bit intimidating at first, I felt really safe the whole time. Our driver for the week, Mr. Simms, was awesome and made us feel comfortable getting around. The Airbnb we stayed at was in a gated community, and it even had a personal gate that was locked at night. Plus, every door to get inside was secured with a locked gate too.

The people I met were so kind and welcoming. I'm really grateful I got to be part of something so special, even for a short time!

Student 2: This past week has been truly an unforgettable experience. This last week has taught me so many things about all the paths that are offered out there for Speech Therapist, it has taught me about a new culture, and I was able to meet the most incredible kids, and work with the greatest people ever. Throughout the four days we spent at the school I learned more than I ever could have imagined. Talking with the other American speech therapists that are working in Jamaica, I learned so much about their different career journeys and paths, and that each person's career looks different. I was able to learn about the endless options speech therapists have nationwide and internationally. The children were the greatest joy! Jamaica is one of the most beautiful places I've ever seen, and I would absolutely love to go back one day if I am able. The people truly made it what it was, Dr. Throneburg organized everything amazing, there was no times where we felt that we weren't in the loop or not being taken care of. Mrs. Magee was the best trip mom we could've asked for, she was amazing to have with us. I really loved the number of girls that went, it was 4 of us Juniors, I Senior, and 3 Grad Students. And it was truly the best group of girls to go on a trip together. A lot of us hardly knew each other at all, but we are absolutely bonded for life after that trip. I would not change one thing about this trip, except to make it longer because it truly was one of the greatest experiences ever. I made lifelong memories and amazing new friendships. Safe to say Jamaica stole a piece of my heart, so I have to go back. ©

Student 3: This has easily been one of the best weeks/experiences of my life. Working with these kids and at Mico Care Centre is so rewarding and I would do it again in a heartbeat. Throughout this past week in Jamaica, I have had the absolute best time and have learned so incredibly much. Being on this trip has allowed me to gain even more clinical experience and has taught me to be more confident when working with a client. The rest of the undergraduates and I did speech therapy with a client Monday-Thursday in the mornings and afternoons. Together we planned each session, the activities, and kept data. We also observed diagnostics every day with the graduate students and kids from Jamaica. Dr.

Throneburg and Brittney Aiken were/are amazing role models for us to watch and learn from as students. They, along with the staff at Mico Care Centre were all very helpful and welcoming the entire week. The kids have been a pleasure to work with. I already miss them so much. While staying here I have never felt unsafe. The atmosphere is so joyous and lively, and everyone that I have met has been extremely kind. Our Airbnb stay was amazing, and the caretaker Robert has gone out of his way to make us feel safe here. He has helped us with anything we may have needed, including catching a lizard in our bedroom! He always locked the doors anytime we left, and he was always a phone call away. Without a doubt I would come back to Jamaica and go on the study abroad trip here again.

Student 4: This past week has been so rewarding, and I have learned so much about myself as a clinician and as a person. This study abroad opportunity has given me so much experience working with clients of different cultures, learning to be adaptive in the moment, and seeing how a school works in another country. I learned how to accommodate each client's strengths and weaknesses, motivators, and attention spans within my plans. One of my clients really enjoyed music-based activities and art, and another client liked working on math problems during his brain breaks. For the diagnostics, I had my first experience a standardized assessment and not just shadowing one. I administered the PPVT and the GFTA as well as assisted with the PLS, LPT, and HAPP. I am so thankful for having this experience already coming into graduate school. I also got to see a variety of behaviors during the diagnostics. It is interesting to see how individuals respond to test after test. One client was very well behaved and remained motivated to complete each assessment, but the other two clients barely even sat still for more than a couple minutes, so more informal play-based observations had to be taken. Again, this helped me think on the spot and be flexible as the clients will not always corporate! Regarding the "fun" parts of the trip outside of the speech sessions, the students really got to connect as friends, and not just clinicians! This trip is something that will bond us together! So many "firsts" happened on this trip for me: snorkeling, hiking a waterfall, drinking coconut water straight from the coconut, eating a fresh mango right off the tree, eating Jamaican patties, driving on the left side of the road, and having a lizard in my room!!! It truly was such an amazing week, so many memories were made.

Student 5: This trip to Jamaica has truly changed my life and made me a more confident clinician than I was before. The bonds I formed with the girls and the children have been more meaningful than I could have ever imagined. Everyone we met was incredibly welcoming and excited to have us there to help. We had a great balance between our clinical work and time to relax and enjoy ourselves—it was the perfect mix. Therapy here is different due to the cultural context, but learning about those differences was an incredible and an eye-opening experience. Before coming, I was a bit concerned about safety, but I've felt completely secure the entire time. Dr. T knows many people in the community, and some even stayed with us, which I really appreciated. The property is gated, with a guard who manually opens and closes the gate, and Robert, the grounds keeper, stayed with us at the Airbnb, which added an extra layer of comfort and security. I'm genuinely so glad I came on this trip and would return in a heartbeat, year after year.

Student 6: I don't think I'll ever be able to fully express everything I learned and experienced during the CDS study abroad trip to Jamaica. It was truly a once-in-a-lifetime opportunity—one that turned classmates into good friends and gave me some sweet memories. I went in barely knowing half the group and left with memories I wouldn't trade for anything.

As a student, I was reminded that learning doesn't stop at the classroom door. Observing diagnostics, sitting in on sessions, and soaking in wisdom from our department chair and graduate students was extremely valuable. Their insight into graduate school, clinical work, and life has made me a more focused, inspired learner with a deepened desire to serve others.

As a future clinician, I learned that growth starts with stepping out of your comfort zone. I arrived with zero clinical experience and was intimidated. But with Dr. Throneburg's guidance and encouragement, I realized this is what I'm meant to do. I think that this trip has significantly

prepared me for 3900 and allowed me to put what I have learned to practice. The students and clients at the school warmed my heart, and in many ways, they taught me more than I taught them.

As a person, I gained a broader view of the world and a deeper appreciation for the global need for Speech-Language Pathologists. The lack of access to services in some communities is heartbreaking, yet the hope we saw in families' eyes was incredibly moving. One child's progress in just four days will stay with me forever. I've questioned if I wanted to be an SLP at times, but now I'm 100% certain—I can't imagine doing anything else.
